PINOLE CITY COUNCIL MINUTES July 17, 2018

The Regular Pinole City Council Meeting was held in the Pinole Council Chambers, 2131 Pear Street, Pinole, California. Mayor Pro Tem Murray called the Regular Meeting of the City Council to order at 6:00 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

a. Code Enforcement Presentation

Development Services Director/City Engineer Miller presented the report and provided an update on Code enforcement activities and sewer lateral code enforcement efforts. She stated that property owners receive informal notification of code enforcement referrals and are given 75 day notice before fines are implemented. Residents are encouraged to submit complaints via the website. Chief Gang stated that animal control response calls are prioritized as they are received.

b. End of the Year presentation from Melanie Fornes, Civicspark Fellow

Melanie Fornes, Civicspark Fellow presented the Year End report and discussed her accomplishments while serving the City of Pinole. She stated that the program is funded in conjunction with East Bay Energy Watch which serves Alameda and Contra Costa counties. Her last day serving the City of Pinole will be August 3, 2018. Council thanked Ms. Fornes for her service and complimented her on the work performed for the City.

6. CITIZENS TO BE HEARD (Public Comments)

The following speakers addressed the City Council:

<u>Kent Moriarty</u>, resident of Pinole, addressed the Council and stated his support of pedestrian activity and bicycling in Pinole. He stated his concern that this item is listed in the Capital Improvement Project as an unfunded item. He encouraged Council to reconsider funding this project to benefit the community.

Bob Kopp, resident of Pinole, addressed the Council and presented a check in the amount of \$3,900 to Pinole TV and will be presenting a check to the Police Explorer program within the next few weeks. Council thanked him for his service to the community.

<u>Jack Meehan</u>, resident of Pinole, addressed the Council and suggested that Council consider a semi-annual outreach program that includes literature with a directory of recreation programs and services and code compliance and enforcement efforts.

<u>Jeff Rubin</u>, President of Pinole Historical Society invited Council and the community to attend the co-sponsored 11th Annual Veteran's Day Memorial and Flag Retirement Ceremony on Sunday, November 11, 2018 at 11:00 a.m.; this year is the 100th anniversary of the signing. He requested that the event be recorded and telecasted.

<u>Dennis Clay</u>, representative of Contra Costa Taxpayers Association (CoCoTax), addressed the Council and inquired about the City's unfunded liability. He provided a handout to Council illustrating the City's liability, he inquired about the City's efforts in addressed this concern. City Manager Fitzer responded to the inquiry pertaining to the City's unfunded liability and stated that the Council has approved an IRA Section 115 trust with a significant amount of investment to address the current and projected liability.

<u>David Ruport</u>, resident of Pinole, addressed the Council and inquired about the City's response to the Grand Jury report on the Joint Power Act authority. He requested that the Council provide documentation on the actual cost of settlement for the Cell Tower litigation. He provided an update to Council on the Pinole 4 Fair Government efforts and projects. City Manager Fitzer stated that the City has received the report and is reviewing it to provide a response to the report. The draft response will be brought to Council for consideration at the September 4th meeting.

<u>Rafael Menis</u>, resident of Pinole, addressed the Council and provided an overview of the City's budget and its unfunded liability. He encouraged members of the community to support the UUT tax measure that will be placed on the ballot.

<u>Irma Ruport</u>, resident of Pinole, invited Council and the community to attend the National Night Out event in her neighborhood on August 7, 2018 at 1131 Marionola Way, Pinole.

<u>Bill Low</u>, resident of Pinole, addressed the Council and requested that the City Manager's report include open cases, closed and pending cases.

Development Services Director/City Engineer Miller presented the report and provided an overview of current public works project specifications. Council stated their concern with threshold amount of \$1 million project approval and their responsibilities to the community in assuring that projects are done correctly. They requested that Notice of Completions be brought

to Council for their review and approval. City Attorney Casher provided an overview of the process and item for discussion by Council as a procedural process.

A. Continued Public Hearing for the Introduction and First Reading of an Ordinance Adding Chapter 12.36 to the Pinole Municipal Code Regarding Responsibility of Property Owner for Maintenance of Adjacent Sidewalk

City Attorney Casher presented the report and provided an overview of the ordinance. He recommended that the City Council open and close the public hearing to allow staff to discuss further and incorporate Council and community input.

At 7:44 p.m., Mayor Banuelos opened the Public Hearing, and the following speakers addressed the Council:

<u>David Ruport</u>, resident of Pinole, addressed the Council and stated his support to have this item discussed at a future meeting in order to consider staff and community input.

<u>Bill Low</u>, resident of Pinole, addressed the Council and stated his concern with the description of sidewalk within the proposed ordinance.

<u>Irma Ruport</u>, resident of Pinole, inquired about the proposed ordinance and suggested inviting members of the public to join the discussion with members of the Council subcommittee and staff.

Having no additional speakers, at 7:51 p.m., Mayor Banuelos closed the Public Hearing.

Councilmember Toms stated that this item will be referred back to the Municipal Code Update Subcommittee for further discussion and review.

Councilmember Long requested that staff be well informed about the sidewalk ordinance and compliance in an effort to better assist residents. She stated that the Council has had numerous discussions on this topic and have provided numerous alternatives to minimize the impact to the community while protecting the City.

ACTION: Motion by Council Members Toms/ Swearingen, to open the public hearing continued from April 17, 2018, and again on June 5, 2018, and thereafter close the public hearing and refer the proposed sidewalk ordinance and sidewalk maintenance program to the Municipal Code Update subcommittee for further consideration.

Review Sewer Rates for Fiscal Years 2018/19 through 2022/23 [Action: Conduct Public Hearing and approve resolution (T. Miller)]

Todd Burton from Wildan Financial presented the report and provided an overview of the proposed sewer rate for FY 2019 and the proposed rate adjustments. Council asked questions and received responses.

At 8:22 p.m., Mayor Banuelos opened the Public Hearing, and the following speakers addressed the Council:

<u>Rafael Menis</u>, resident of Pinole, addressed the Council and stated his concern with the proposed rate increase, outreach to residents without internet access and information included in the power point presentation.

<u>Chris Wimmer</u>, resident of Pinole, addressed the Council and read into the record his opposition to the rate increase. He stated his understanding of the need to increase fees; however, he expressed his concern for the method in which the proposed increase will be implemented.

Development Services Director/City Engineer Miller provided a response to Mr. Wimmer's questions on the current rate structure for residential and multi-family units. City Attorney Casher stated that this is a Proposition 218 hearing and the procedure set forth for approval of a rate increase is not set forth by the City Council; it is dictated by Prop 218, so a 50% threshold of current property owners or customers of records is statutory prescribed. The City has noticed public hearings for discussion of the rate study and sent out notices to the public to keep them informed.

This rate is for a service provided and fees collected are protected in an enterprise fund and can't be intermingled with general fund sources. The SRF requires the City to disburse the revenue generating methodology for rates equal and consistently, not allowing for a senior discount. Assistant City Manager De La Rosa stated that under Proposition 218, the City is to proportionally charge customers for their fair share of services. If Council chooses to provide a discount for a lower rate, the discount can't be attributed or charged to another user. The general fund will be required to make up the difference in cost, with no other form of recuperating funds.

At 8:36 p.m., having no additional speakers Mayor Banuelos closed the Public Hearing. City Attorney Casher stated that all written and oral protests (22) were received as required by Proposition 218. As the threshold required was not met, Council has the authority to adopt and implement rates as proposed.
